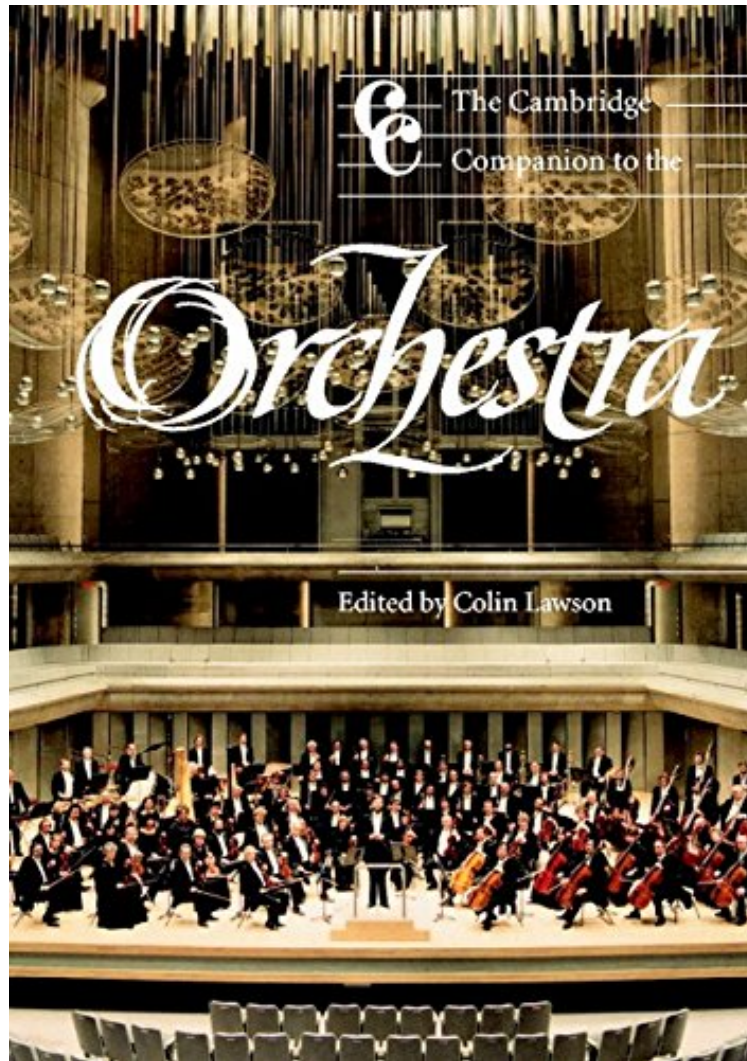

The orchestra as instrument and organization By Philippe Vandebroek This book brings together a collection of essays that illuminates the symphonic orchestra from two vantage points: the orchestra as a sophisticated instrument, and the orchestra as a peculiar organisational entity. The former focus dominates, however, with contributions, amongst others, on the art of orchestration, the orchestral

repertory, the use of period instruments, early recordings, training orchestral musicians, etc. The institutional dimension is less well served. There are chapters on orchestra's educational programmes, on the life of an orchestral musician, and the history of conducting. There is also an essay that focuses on the history of four prominent orchestras (Berlin, Leningrad, New York, London Symphony). The concluding chapter on the future of the orchestra, a burning issue given dwindling public resources devoted to the arts, is unfortunately rather shallow (and given that it has been written over ten years ago in need of an update). The most surprising inclusion is an essay on the art of score reading. Quite well written and particularly suitable for laypeople, but why it had to be part of this collection is rather unclear.
