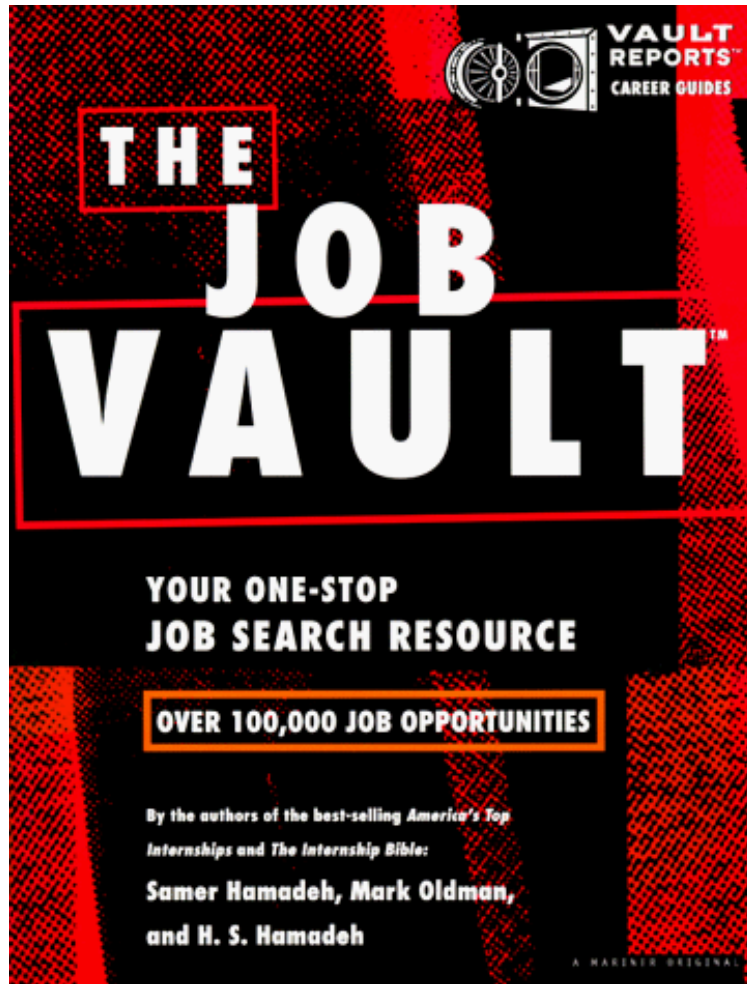

From Library Journal The authors of the well-known Princeton Internship Bible (Random, 1995) have created an interesting and worthwhile publication for job seekers. Similar to Jack Plunket's The Almanac of American Employers 1996-97 (LJ 9/1/97), their work profiles more than 500 U.S. employers—their idea of the best places to work. A brief directory format gives up-to-date statistics, including industries, addresses, phone numbers, job hot lines, web and E-mail addresses, major hiring departments, annual incomes, numbers of employees, and names of CEOs. Evaluation appears in sections covering "Uppers" and "Downers"; the best and worst aspects of working for a company; "Getting Hired"; assessments of actual hiring criteria; "Our Survey Says"; the inside world, which resulted from interviewing thousands of employees; and measurements in five areas: pay, hours, dress code, job satisfaction, and resume radiance (how closely companies look at resumes). Interspersed throughout are single-page entries ranging from biographies to highlighted job sources.
