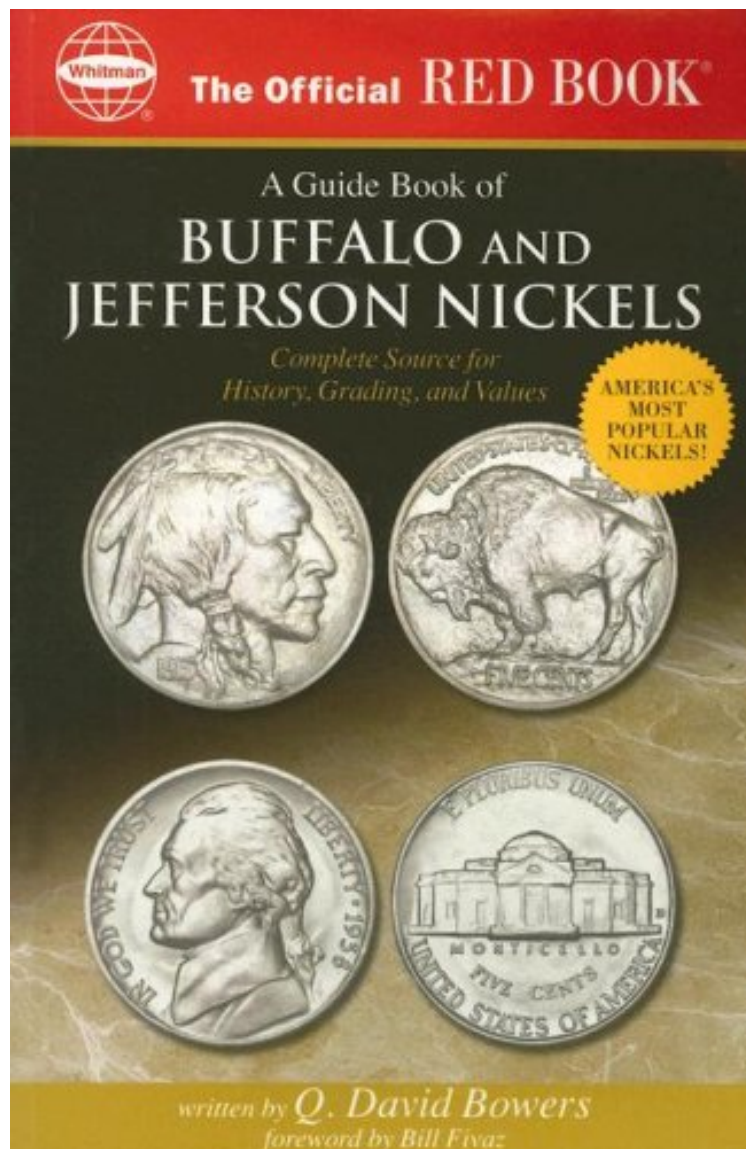

It has 277 pages total of history, the coining process, grading standards and "how to" grade information with pictures. Also has mintages for each year/mint with a price guide. I don't know up to date the price guide is, (probably more as a general guide as prices change daily) still a nice section for each coin. It has a section for general error and pattern nickels also. By anon He really emphasizes important stuff like strike quality for Buffalo Nickels that, for some reason, few others do. Lots of great information there about eye appeal and this and that for various dates. I believe he actually vastly understates the true rarity of 100% complete full-strikes, which may be at times 10-80x more rare than he suggests. I also think they need to add a full strike minus category because there are many coins that are just missing a single hairline above the braid but are otherwise perfect but they get dumped in with all the rest of the strong strikes even though the ones that are close but just barely miss are much more rare (also for some dates no full strike even exists). It's also nice that he tells people to watch out for the way the grading services (and most dealers) routinely over-grade circulated Buffalo Nickels these days and how a coin is a lot more than just a number on a slab.
